1.1 INTRODUCTION

Willingdon College, Sangli is established in the year 1919. Ours is the oldest and reputed, institution of higher education in the state of Maharashtra. It is Government University recognised, fully aided institute affiliated to Shivaji University, Kolhapur. Some of our courses are run on self-financing basis also, The college has Arts and Science wings. It offers Bachelor's Degree programme in Physics, Botany, Zoology, Microbiology, Biotechnology, Chemistry, Mathematics, Electronics, Statistics and Computer Science. The college also offers Post-graduate Degree Course in Marathi, Hindi, English, Sanskrit, Economics, Mathematics, Chemistry, Physics, Electronics, and computer Science. We have Post graduate laboratory recognition in Chemistry. The college has good infrastructural facilities with huge campus of 45 acres which houses our sister institutes imparting education from KG to PG. We have fully qualified and experienced faculty members. The College has been accredited by NAAC (National Assessment & Accreditation Council, Bangalore, India) with 'A' Grade.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Teaching, learning and evaluation plays very crucial role for growth of any educational institution. Our college believes in value based education with practical. Keeping this in mind we adopt appropriate and innovative strategies. The admission process is transparent and guidelines of the Shivaji University, Kolhapur and the Government of Maharashtra are followed stringently. Admission Committee is constituted to ensure fair and transparent admission process and to counsell the students and help them. All the activities of the institute are organized according to the “Academic Calendar” prepared by Academic Planning and Monitoring Committee. Most our students are from the semi-urban areas and socially and economically weaker sections. The college conducts add-on courses, remedial classes, and difficulty solving periods for slow learners. The advanced learners are encouraged to participate in Avishkar, a research based competitive event of Shivaji University, Kolhapur.

The teaching - learning process focuses on improving the students knowledge. Seminars, surveys, study tours, group discussions and project work are undertaken to make the teaching and learning more effective. It is mandatory for teachers to submit teaching plan at the beginning of the academic year.

In order to bring transparency in evaluation process, the assessed answer books are provided as per students' demand for the verification of their marks. The students' feedback on teaching - learning - evaluation analyzed regularly to update teaching - learning-evaluation process.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Teaching-Learning and evaluation is the backbone of any institute. Our College has maintained the transparent online admission procedure for all classes. Admission are given to all eligible students as per the rules and guidelines of Shivaji University . The state government's reservation policy is followed for admitting students from the reserved category. We have maintained a good student teacher ratio (28.4:1) for the latest completed academic year. The college has implemented an organised mentoring programme. Faculty members apply various student centric teaching approaches viz. hands on training, internships, case study, group discussions, study tours etc. The participative learning is advanced through the organization of events like Chem-O-Joy, Willsoft, Ferment, Momentum, seminar presentations etc. It helps to enhance their critical and creative thinking abilities. Teachers frequently use ICT tools that include online teaching platforms like Microsoft teams, google meet, zoom to deliver excellent lessons. Faculty members use power point presentations, necessary softwares, self-created videos to make the teaching learning process more interactive. Teachers address the needs of students with different capabilities. Learning levels are identified at the beginning of the academic year. At present 68 full time teachers are working in the college against 100 sanctioned posts out of them 45 teachers are qualified having Ph. D./ NET/ SET/ SLET etc. Students’ Formative assessment of the students is carried out in accordance with the CIE schedule prepared by examination committee and overseen by IQAC. These assessments are carried out both offline and online and students receive timely communication regarding their performance. Examination related complaints are resolved in the stipulated time. Programme outcomes and course outcomes are designed by concerned departments as per the Bloom’s taxonomy and displayed on the college website. Learning outcomes are examined using both direct and indirect approaches in terms of knowledge and skills. The final year university exam result is more than 90 % indicating the effectiveness of teaching learning. Valuable feedback from students is collected every year enabling continuous improvement of the teaching learning process.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The college has a central research committee that oversees the research activities of the college and promote research culture. There are twenty-eight full time teachers with Ph.D. degree out of them fourteen teachers are recognized as Ph.D. guide of Shivaji University, Kolhapur. The College has ten post graduate departments with having fifteen research students registered for Ph.D. under Shivaji University, Kolhapur. The college has more than twenty active MOUs with various institutes for students, teacher exchange and research promotion.

The college promotes research culture among students and staff members, by organizing International and National level conferences, Workshops on research, research methodology, innovations and concurrent topics. Also, various departments organize Quiz competition, Poster presentation, Seminar competition for students.

Seed money for research activities is provided to teachers through an established mechanism. Deccan Education Society has provided financial assistance for newly established Physics, Chemistry and Electronics PG laboratories for laboratory equipment's. To enhance ICT facilities, the college has purchased **190** PCs and **4 LCD** projectors and 2 Digital boards during last five years.

Teachers have published 179 research papers in UGC Care / Scopus indexed journals/ Peer Reviewed journals. Also written 75 books/chapters in books/ articles in conference proceedings.

The college organizes social outreach activities and other awareness activities that are meant for helping society and training students to shoulder all responsibilities with ease and impact. The college undertakes various extension activities in the neighbourhood community through the National Cadet Corps Unit and National Service Scheme and other departments. Blood donation camp and Health check-up camps are yearly organized by NCC and NSS in coordination with Government Medical College and Hospital, Miraj. NCC, NSS and other departments organize rally and awareness programs on Beti Bacho Beti Padhao, Women Empowerment, National Integrity, Aids Awareness, Environmental Awareness, Personal Health and Hygiene, Road Safety, Tree Plantation, Plastic Eradication, No Vehicle Day, Visit to Orphanages and Anganwadi, Voters Awareness, Swacchata Abhiyan, Communal Harmony Campaign, Azadi Ka Amrut Mahostav, Organ Donation, No Tobacco and Drugs Consumption Pledge etc.

The students of our college actively participate in social service activities leading to their overall development. Such awareness programs positively impact students' emotional, intellectual, social, and inter- personal development.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Our Deccan Education Society, Pune has a number of colleges and institutes under different universities with many regulatory boards, such as UGC, AICTE. As per the guidelines of Maharashtra Public University Act, 2016, the College Development Committee regulates the working of the college. So the college has many additional courses on both grant and non-grant basis. The feedback mechanism is followed to get improvement in physical, academic and support infrastructure from students, stakeholders and parents. In the case of academic infrastructure, the college has a separate mechanism. The college has two major wings: Arts and Science . The support systems are made available to staff, students and stake holders. The ICT lab has Wi-Fi

equipped computers. The UGC Network Resource has five computers with Wi-Fi connectivity. The library is fully automated. The Library Committee has scheduled classwise distribution of books. There is a reference section for faculties and research scholars and stakeholders. It has a number of journals, e-books, theses and encyclopedias. The daily transaction section is updated with N-LIST, INFLIBNET and VIDYASAGAR softwares. Anybody can search books, references and study material by using QRCode / OPAC. The separate study section of a capacity of hundred students is available at the college. The special coaching cell for competitive exams is undertaken by the library. Rajarshi Shahu Chhatrapati Boys' Hostel and Girls' Hostel have 150 students. The accommodation is provided at a reasonable rate to afford common students. All the hostel students are covered by insurance. The mess, canteen, security, cleaning and sweeping services are made available on a yearly contract basis. During the admissions and exams the college provides a free-support system like documentation, zeroxing, counseling and banking. The 120 CCTV cameras are installed to ensure the discipline at campus and in the classrooms, labs, library, offices and cabins. The AMCs are made with the private agencies for upkeeping the facilities like drinking water, electricity, scanning and printing, computers, LAN/WAN network and telephone. There is a mechanism to monitor all renderings of facilities through suggestion boxes and feedback from students, alumni, faculties, non-teaching staff, parents and stakeholders.

Student Support and Progression

A scholarship committee headed by Principal, consisting teaching and administrative staff is constituted every year. The members of committee create awareness and guide the students regarding various scholarship schemes of Government as well as Non-Government Scholarships. An objective of committee is to provide financial assistance to eligible students to pursue their studies. The college organizes Yoga sessions. Yoga orientation and training is provided to ensure good mental and physical capacity of students, staff and members of the society. Language departments are trying to develop the communication skills, translation skill of the students who are mostly from vernacular background. The department of Computer Science engages various courses to enhance the technical skill in Information and Communication technology (ICT).

Every department of our college guides the students regarding the career opportunities in their subjects. Workshops are organized for the preparation of NET/SET and competitive examinations. The placement cell provides guidance to the students for selecting their careers, The students are exposed to the opportunities in their subjects. The college organizes workshops, seminars for pre-placement training. It also circulates recruitment advertisements.

We have prosperous legacy of sports and cultural activities. Our students have displayed excellent and outstanding performance in various Inter-Collegiate, Inter-Zonal and University level sports tournaments. We try to enhance their talents, so they can participate in different cultural events and competitions. We also publish Willingdonian magazine annually which comprises the article exclusively written by students. It also contains reports of activities of various clubs in the college and an elaborate photo gallery providing the glimpses of the campus activities.

Many of our alumni are working in different walks of life and having outstanding abilities. They are invited in the college to share their experiences and knowledge as chief guests, resource persons on various occasions. The alumni-student interaction motivates, enlightens and help students to bring out best in them, and prepare them for higher studies and placement interviews. Alumni have contributed significantly through financial contribution and guiding the students.

Governance, Leadership and Management

As per the vision and mission institution is committed to empower the students by offering them knowledge, skills and values at affordable cost. The administrative structure of the institute consists of the Governing Council, College Development Committee, Principal, IQAC, HoDs, teaching and non-teaching staff. The Deccan Education Society is committed to a culture of participative management. To meet the relevant objectives, our institution prepares a five-year perspective/strategic plan reflecting institution's Vision, Mission, and objectives and executes it with collective efforts. A decentralized functioning mechanism empowers the departments to function with greater flexibility and at the same time they share the responsibilities.

E-governance is implemented in various areas of operations like administration, finance, admission and examination. Mobile apps are also made available to students and teachers.

Several welfare measures like financial assistance, sports facilities, staff quarters, etc. are also made available for students, teachers, and non-teaching staff. Teachers are encouraged to participate in various FDPs, MDPs and training courses and provided financial assistance. The performance Appraisal System is effectively implemented by the institute for teaching and non-teaching staff. Teachers' performance is assessed based on API SCORE and confidential reports.

In connection with financial management, internal and external financial audits are conducted regularly. A salary grant is a major fund received from the government of Maharashtra. Additionally, the institution obtains funds from Shivaji University, Kolhapur, UGC, and other funding agencies for academic, research and infrastructural development.

The IQAC plays key role in institutionalizing quality-enhancing practices in all areas. It include the introduction of new programmes, adoption of student-centric methods and innovative teaching-learning procedures, value-added courses, skill-based certificate courses, research, student support services, faculty empowerment initiatives, collaborative activities, feedback on institutional services, etc. Every year institution conducts academic and administrative audits and as per the recommendation of the committee, IQAC takes follow-up action. The institution has also participated in the NIRF ranking.

To fulfill the objectives of the institute, the college has taken major efforts for academic and all round excellence in respect of all and inclusiveness alliance with the Community Encouragement of Innovation, Experimentation and Creativity. The entire campus is kept under security services for 24X 7 and surveillance through CCTV cameras. For it the college has implemented the Green campus committee and has a regular practice of implementing every type of waste management by following 4R principles. The campus has adopted the Environmental and Civil Engineering solutions for "Clean and Green recognition". The college has also focused on providing basic education to inculcate the human values and professional ethics among students through various activities. The college conducts various

activities focusing on students' mental and physical health like celebration of “International Yoga Day”, health check up camps, sports and cultural promoting programs etc.

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	<p>Willingdon College, Sangli is one of the colleges of Deccan Education Society, Pune. As the motto of Society is “Union is Strength”, all colleges follow with a vision of cheapening of education to all. The college has nearly strength of 2000 students having admission at various courses and departments. In order to cater their demand, there are 18 departments and committees like CDC, Culture and Fine arts, Language Association. Through multiple activities such as lecture series, cultural gathering, competitions, exhibitions and study visits, students demands get catered. Shivaji University Kolhapur has setup number of multidisciplinary papers: for under graduate students. Democracy and Good Governance , Personality Development, Environment Science, Presentation and interview Skills and introduction to Indian Constitution. At the post graduation level there are other interdisciplinary papers: such as Communicative English, Fundamentals of Information Technology, ICT Tools, Chromatographic Techniques, IT and Graph Theory. The college has number of enriched labs of all Science and IT disciplines. A demand of Arts and Fine Arts could be fulfilled by using Velankar Assembly Hall, Smart Class room No. 20, Open stage, Recreation Hall. At the same time demand of sports could be catered through huge ground., running tracks, tennis court, Holly-ball ground, and gymnasium. The college has active MOU with YCMOU Nasik for Diploma In Yoga Shikshak. However number of students, changing scenario of society, their living standards, the college requires many skill oriented, job oriented courses at UG and PG. To encash power of new generation and to improve employability of students such courses have high demand. The students' health, knowledge and intellect could be developed for new age by introducing courses such as advanced technology, various art, multitasking abilities and imparting multilingual , multicultural knowledge, The management has full support to construct required infrastructure for innovative courses. The courses at college have traditional sort of exposure, hence it is opportunity to enrich students by introducing new courses in future.</p>
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	1) As per the guidelines of the Shivaji University, Kolhapur, the institution has right to initiate the

academic bank of credits under National Education Policy 2020. This will encourage and promote the entire stakeholder for multidisciplinary liberal education. As per the New Education Policy, the ABC has been set up by the University Grants Commission (UGC) in which students will be given multiple entries and exit options. The institute will keep the academic records of the students into Academic Bank Credits in digital mode at central office on the University Portal. 2) The institution is going to be registered at Shivaji University, Kolhapur for academic bank of credits which will permit the learners to take the benefits of multiple entries and exits during the specified program undertaken. 3) The institution is affiliated to Shivaji University, Kolhapur and the institution has decided to follow the policy of the Shivaji University. Our institution has signed MoUs with various other institutions, corporate house and industries which will help to transfer the credits earned by the students. Our parent institution has collaboration with foreign universities and in such cases credit transfer will smoothly work for the joint degree with foreign institution. 4) Teaching learning framework of our college is managed and approved by the Shivaji University, where the conventional courses curriculum is deigned by the board of study members. The university arranges the new syllabus workshop for all concerned teaching faculties. The faculty members attend the Refresher, Orientation programmes, short term programmes, seminars and conferences offered by the UGC recognized bodies like UGC, SWAYAM, NPTEL, etc. The college has enriched library which is atomized as per the UGC norms. This helps staff and students to access the library at any time any where. The institution has its transparent examination and evaluation system. The system is implemented for the exam purpose both online and offline mode. Each department conducts the internal tests to evaluate. The record is in hard and softcopy format. 5) The College has appointed teacher coordinator for the management of the Academic Credit Bank record purpose. Through the longin the credits earned during the specific year can be stored. The ABC record be provided to the university for further action under the guidelines of Shivaji University. The students have given number of the credit based courses and after completing the respective course the credits will be

transferred in his/her account. 6) Our college runs many self learning and add-on courses along with the certificate courses in various disciplines. Students from different streams can participate binary courses and choose their subjects as per their choices.

3. Skill development:

1) NSQF is a nationally integrated and competency-based education framework that allows individuals to achieve their desired competence level. Willingdon College has already envisioned the need and sailing in the same direction to get the skill based knowledge and jobs. 2) College conducts following Certificate and value added course such as Networking technology, soldering techniques and PCB design, General Knowledge, Certificate course in French language, Certificate course in German Language, Proficiency in English Language, Certificate course in Hindi translation, Certificate course in Gramin Patrakarita, Chromatography, Graph Theory, Value added course in Latex, Libreoffice, Value added course in Python, etc The . college always organizes various activities for inculcating values, rights, duties and responsibilities as a citizen of India abiding by the Constitution and respect its ideals and institutions, the National Flag and the National Anthem; following the noble ideals which inspired our national struggle for freedom; promoting harmony and the spirit of common brotherhood amongst all the people of India. The university curriculum has made two papers mandatory for first and third-year degree students viz. 'Democracy, Elections and Good Governance' and 'The introduction to Indian Constitution' which enhance values of Constitution. 4) Institute takes the efforts to the skill based courses and education by various ways. Travel and tourism, Soil water analysis, IoT, Networking Technology, Soldering Techniques and PCB design, Cyber security, Information Technology, E content development. 5) The new learning methods and digital tools are being used for the learners, like Massive Open Online Courses (MOOC), Virtual learning methods, Google Classroom, Teams. etc. The faculty has created E-content in their respective subjects. The college has skill and entrepreneurship development center through which several skill development courses are offered to the students. 6) Incubation and innovation centre of the college has provided the various skill

based projects and ideas to develop the need based skill. The department of Electronics has provided the facility to develop the various Electronic circuit components to build up the required circuits to the students. The students make use of laboratory to develop new circuits and applications in the centre. Various departments Electronic and other instruments are also repaired through the students. The water testing is carried in the department of Chemistry and department of Botany also gives the services to the other colleges and industries for spotting and analyzing the plant specimen. Zoology department provide the skill knowledge to identification of the animals.

4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):

1) For the unity and integration of the country like India, languages and culture plays important and needful role. Our college has taken the initiative to developed E content and PDF for course in languages like Hindi, Marathi, Sanskrit, English. Traditional knowledge refers to the knowledge, innovations and practices of indigenous and local communities. Traditional knowledge is developed and transmitted orally from generation to generation which has local culture, environment and ethics. Nowadays the IT infrastructure is developed in which the traditional knowledge is transferred and used by throughout the world. Learning in mother tongue has greater advantage for the society and its development. 2) Several upcoming courses are delivered the knowledge in bilingual mode and also multilingual mode if required. The institute has taken the initiatives to organize the training programs, workshops. Teachers in the institute have developed study material in the different language which will impart the traditional knowledge among the students with different mother tongue. 3) The University has designed the language based programmes and following courses run in the institute - 1. B.A. and M.A. Marathi 2. B.A and M.A. Hindi 3. B.A. and M.A. English 4. B.A. and MA. Sanskrit 5) Other courses taught in regional Marathi language are B.A. and M.A. in History, Economics, Geography, Scientific Method, Psychology, Research Methodology etc. However, Hindi, English, Sanskrit, references are given if required. 4) To penetrate the regional language knowledge at grass root level value added and certificate courses are organized to impart

the ancient Indian language, culture, art and tradition. This will help to impart the knowledge to new generation. Traditional days and programmes are celebrated in the college. History department runs the Modi script programme. It organizes the ancient Indian warfare tactics demonstrations. Marathi Department runs the certificate course in Gramin Pratrakarita, and celebrates Raksha bandhan, Tilgul Kavi Samhelan, Tie day and Saree day . English department runs the Proficiency in English as well as spoken English course for B. Sc. and B. A students to enhance the communication skills and celebrates English day. Russian and German language courses are also taught in the college. For all language courses language laboratory is used to introduced and practice in linguistic skills.

Response:

Curriculum is the essence of any vibrant educational system. All other aspects like teaching, learning, evaluation, research, development, infrastructure, learning resources, student activities and support system revolve around it. There ought to be a dynamic curriculum with necessary additions and changes introduced in it from time to time by the respective university with a prime objective to maintain updated curriculum and also providing their inputs to take care of fast paced development in the knowledge of the subject concerned.

Deccan Education Society's Willingdon College, Sangli is affiliated to Shivaji University, Kolhapur. The curriculum is framed by the university and implemented by the college. The NEP-2020 ensures sufficient choice to students. University declares the academic calendar. Based on it, our college prepares its academic calendar for that academic year including workload, recruitment and teaching plan etc. to ensure proper teaching learning and evaluation. The distribution of the workload is done considering the teachers' demand, aptitude, interest and expertise in a particular subject. The department provides teaching plan, curriculum and attendance sheets to the teachers. Teachers prepares month wise teaching plan for the academic year. Since the teaching plan is based on the academic calendar, the completion of the course can be ensured in time.

Time - table committee prepares the time - table. The daily monitoring mechanism keeps an eye on regular classes and schedule. Necessary adjustments in class schedule is done in case of leave of teacher.

For better understanding of the topic, use of ICT has been effectively used by the faculty. Teachers use power point presentation, video clips, computer, laptop, tab, LCD projector and mobile etc. makes the curriculum delivery effective and interesting.

Different teaching methodologies including seminars, assignments, group discussions, and brain storming sessions etc. are used. There is a compulsory course on field visit/project report. Students have to visit different industries, based on his /her experience, he /she has to write a project report. This report is evaluated by the internal and external examiners of the university. This increases his /her exposure with the outside world.

In order to develop the skills and knowledge, various developments have devised enrichment courses known as add - on courses. Add - on courses supplement regular course content and help students learn essential life skills. Add - on courses with transferable skills provide guidance to students to build a sound career and explore new avenues. The Add-on courses undertaken by the various departments are the result of a sharp awareness of national as well as global needs.

College organizes workshops, seminars, conferences and expert lectures to increase the academic potential

Human values are addressed in both UG and PG courses specifically in Language Departments, Geography, Chemistry, Computer Science, Psychology and History etc.

Professional ethics which prepare the students to practice proper ethical, moral and professional standards is a part of curriculum in UG and PG Information Technology. Professional ethics are conveyed to the students, so that plagiarism is prevented.

Response:

The college emphasises to the holistic development of students. Various approaches are used to make teaching and learning dynamic and student-centered. The college has implemented a number of student-centered pedagogical techniques to improve students' learning levels.

Experiential Learning

One of the key approaches employed by the college is experimental learning. It promotes an exploration-based approach. The technique is particularly utilized in the teaching and learning process for basic sciences and computer science, enabling students to enhance their learning capacities. The college offers internship opportunities, organizes hands-on training workshops, instrument awareness programs, laboratory safety workshops, analytical techniques, and activities like sky observation, case studies, and industrial visits, all aimed at improving students' learning aptitude through experiential learning.

Participative Learning

Participative learning is another prominent aspect promoted by the college, fostering active student involvement through practices like group projects, quiz competitions, presentations, seminars, book exhibitions, survey report drafting, elocutions, and poetry competitions. Programs like Chem-o-Joy, Willsoft, Ramanujan, Ferment, Momentum, and Uddan are set up to get students involved and to explore themselves. These activities enable students to enhance their communication and teamwork skills.

Problem solving

The college also emphasizes problem-solving as a crucial skill and incorporates it into various disciplines such as social sciences, mathematical sciences, statistics and computer sciences. To support problem-solving, the departments utilize a range of softwares. Furthermore, counseling sessions and mentoring practices are adopted to enhance students' problem-solving abilities.

Students quickly assimilate the knowledge with the help of ICT and cutting edge technologies. Teachers frequently use ICT tools and techniques to make the teaching learning process more interactive. In terms of technology integration, the college has procured licensed copies of the Microsoft Teams teaching platform and also purchase own online platform called Mastersoft, catering to admissions, exams, and other administrative purposes. Faculty members have utilized a number of online platforms that includes Microsoft teams, Google Meet, Zoom etc. Teachers use Shodhganga, e-books, and e-journals to expand and update their expertise. To facilitate effective teaching and learning, faculty members employ various tools including PPTs, PDFs, YouTube, LCDs, Google Forms, e-books/e-journals, and learning management systems like Microsoft Teams and Google Classrooms. Social media applications like WhatsApp, Telegram groups are utilized for academic purposes, enabling teachers to share study materials and educational notices with students. Students are encouraged to create presentations, assignments, projects, and field reports using MS Word, MS PowerPoint, MS Excel, and other ICT tools. Moreover, faculty members utilize a variety of softwares like Matlab, Latex, Sailab, Python, Wolfram cloud, Mathematica, Chems sketch, Simulink, and more to solve problems. 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

Evaluation is an important part of the teaching-learning process. The college has robust mechanism of internal and external assessment and grievance redressal. The examination committee of a college along with the IQAC, prepares a comprehensive mechanism at the start of each academic year to enable the smooth conduction of these evaluations. As our college is affiliated with Shivaji University, Kolhapur, we adhere to the University's norms and examination schedule. The college uses a variety of methods to evaluate students continuously based on the criteria set forth by the college's examination committee. The examination schedule is displayed on the college website and notice board in advance. The departmental level student performance is assessed using Unit tests, MCQs test, home and class assignments, presentations, seminars, field survey, project and group discussions. Additionally, the departments employ innovative evaluation techniques such as open book exams, online test on google forms, model preparation, poster presentations. University has made a 20% component of student performance an internal review at the institute level for the final year UG and both years of PG the marks are entered on the University portal, which are calculated for the final grade. The college has conducted the online examinations using Mastersoft ERP ITLE module during the Covid pandemic. The first year of the B.Sc., B.A., and B.Sc. Computer Science Entire undergraduate programmes are examined by the institution on behalf of Shivaji University, Kolhapur. The Principal of the college has appointed the Chairman/Coordinator examination committee. The faculties are appointed as paper setter and evaluators. The Central Assessment Program is undertaken for the external evaluation with proper appointment of director. The internal and external examinations are commenced under the observation of Chairman of examination, SRPD director, senior supervisor, junior supervisors, flying squad as per the rules and regulations of Shivaji University, Kolhapur.

The institution makes a lot of efforts to ensure transparency in all activities related to exams at various stages. In this consideration the college deals with examination related grievances transparently, efficiently and in appropriate manners. The examination related grievances of the students are considered and scrutinized at the departmental, college and university level depending upon the level of the grievances.

Information about the exam is posted on the college website. The same is posted in advance to students on the notice board and also via social media apps. To avoid fraud and promote transparency, all exams are held under the rigorous supervision of an internal/external supervisor and an internal/external squad. Central Assessment Programme undertaken by the college as per the rules and regulations of the University. The college conducts the first year UG university exams and to make the procedure transparent, provides facility for getting the photo copies of answer papers. The student can apply for the copy within a week after the results. If there is discrepancy in evaluation, student can apply for the reevaluation within seven days. If any change in marks, it is conveyed to university within stipulated time.

2.6.1 Programme Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) for all Programmes offered by the institution are stated and displayed on website

Response:

The primary objective of the institution is to provide education to students, aiming to enhance their subject knowledge, create awareness about societal demands, and equip them to utilize their knowledge for the betterment of the community. In order to achieve these objectives, the college has developed Program Outcomes (POs), Program Specific Outcomes (PSOs), and Course Outcomes (COs) that are in line with the goals, vision, and mission of the college. Every department has created Program Specific Outcomes (PSOs) and Course Outcomes (COs) for their respective disciplines, with input from all stakeholders. The development of Program Outcomes (POs) has been a collaborative effort, involving various stakeholders such as IQAC members, department heads, program coordinators, senior faculty members, alumni, external academic experts in consideration of Shivaji University, to which the college is affiliated. The programme assessment committee then reviewed and advised on the drafted POs. Finally, the amended COs, PSOs, and POs were authorised by the Principal, have been included in the department's syllabi and published on the college website. The college has also offered value-added and skill-based certificate courses in areas such as Soil and Water Analysis, Vermiculture, Introduction to Latex, Spoken English, Travel and Tourism, Basic of Python, GIS and GNSS etc. Faculty members also serve on the BOS and help to design the curriculum for the various programmes offered by the University. The IQAC encourages faculties to organize and attend the revised syllabus workshops.

The college ensures that all faculty members are aware of the program outcomes, program-specific outcomes, and course outcomes. At the beginning of each academic year, teachers acquaint students with the PSOs and COs, enabling them to understand the intended outcomes before commencing their syllabus for the semester. Faculty members discuss these outcomes in the classroom, emphasizing the correlation between POs, COs, and the question paper format. In the principle address, the principal communicates

with the students about these outcomes. Students are encouraged to visit the library to access the curriculum, PSOs, and COs. This facilitates students who enroll to Willingdon College for a specific program and understanding the learning outcomes and syllabus. COs are expressed as sentences that clearly describe the knowledge, skills, and attributes students will gain upon successful completion of a course. These COs are written in accordance with the revised Bloom's Taxonomy and are measurable, attainable, and manageable in number. Faculty members disseminate these outcomes to students at the start of the teaching session, and this is reinforced periodically throughout the semester along with its correlation with assessments. The college values feedback and actively seeks it from students and parents regarding the syllabus in order to update with students' requirement and potential outcomes of the programmes.

The College has developed a comprehensive approach for measuring program outcomes and course outcomes, which ultimately enhances the academic quality of the institution and improves graduate outcomes. The evaluation of Program Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) is conducted using both direct and indirect methods. In the direct method, the institution considers students' performance in university examinations, including their term work marks for internal evaluation. This evaluation encompasses various components such as seminar presentations, assignment submissions, laboratory examinations, project evaluations, test papers, and viva voce examinations. These assessments effectively measure the learning outcomes of the students. To align with the course outcomes, specific assessment tools like unit tests, surprise tests, and laboratory practicals are designed and implemented. The indirect method of measuring course outcomes involves assessing students' performance in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. These activities provide valuable opportunities for students to apply their knowledge and skills outside the classroom, contributing to their overall development and the attainment of course outcomes. For each course in every program, specific attainment levels are set for course outcomes at both postgraduate (PG) and undergraduate (UG) levels. These levels are categorized as follows:

Level 0: No student in the class scores 50% or more marks.

Level 1: Less than 20% of students score 50% or more marks.

Level 2: Between 20% and 50% of students score 50% or more marks.

Level 3: 50% or more of students score 50% or more marks.

The target level for course outcome attainment is set at 2.5. This means that the college aims to achieve a minimum attainment level of 2.5 in the performance of students for each course. Both the direct and

indirect methods are utilized to measure the attainment of course outcomes, and the results are obtained accordingly. In addition to course outcomes, the attainment of Program Outcomes (POs) is also crucial. Course outcomes contribute to the attainment of program outcomes. The assessment of program outcome attainment is based on the average outcome attainment levels of the corresponding courses, as well as program-specific activities, progression, and placement. The target level for program outcome attainment is set at Level 2.5, indicating the college's commitment for achieving a high level of performance among its students. The output of program outcomes involves considering indicators such as university rank-holders, students with merit scholarships, progression to higher studies, and successful placements. The college collects input from alumni and employers regarding curricular aspects, and these suggestions are diligently taken into consideration. Furthermore, the college conducts annual Academic Audits through the IQAC (Internal Quality Assurance Cell), which closely observes and analyzes the results of both continuous internal evaluations (CIE) and semester examinations. The audits provide constructive suggestions to enhance the attainment of COs, PSOs and POs. Through this comprehensive approach for measuring program and course outcomes, the college ensures the continuous upgradation of academic quality, enabling students to excel in their studies and succeed in their future endeavors.

3.2 Innovation Ecosystem

3.2.1 Institution has created an ecosystem for innovations, Indian Knowledge System (IKS), including awareness about IPR, establishment of IPR cell, Incubation centre and other initiatives for the creation and transfer of knowledge/technology and the outcomes of the same are evident

Response:

The college has a central research committee that oversees the research activities of the college. We have created an ecosystem through utilization of spacious workspaces with modern laboratory equipment, computers, high speed internet, Wi-Fi and academic material resources in the libraries for teachers and students. The college promotes research culture among students and staff members, by organizing international and national level conferences, workshops on research methodology, workshops on intellectual property rights.

Our Society has provided financial assistance for newly established Physics, Chemistry and Electronics PG laboratories for laboratory equipment. To enhance ICT facilities, the college has purchased 189 PCs and 7 LCD projectors and 2 Digital boards during last five years. Seed money is provided to teachers through the established mechanism.

The college has signed MOUs with other institutes and laboratories through which the college has organized many collaborative activities and students are encouraged to participate activities. Entrepreneurship is encouraged through workshops, seminars, certificate courses and competitions by various departments. Field studies or study tours are organized as a part of their project work. Industrial

and Research Laboratory visits provide better exposure to students to enhance creativity and innovation.

There are 34 full time teachers with Ph.D. degree out of them 14 teachers have recognition as Ph.D. guide of Shivaji University, Kolhapur. Under their supervision 30 research students are registered for Ph.D. and 13 students have completed their Ph.D. The UGC has sanctioned amount of rupees 4.75 lakhs to Dr. Usha S. Yadav of Department of Botany and Dr. Vishnu D. Wasamkar of Department of Marathi has been sanctioned grant of rupees 1.85 lakhs for research projects. The Sahitya Academy, New Delhi has sanctioned rupees 1.09 lakhs to Dr. Balwant V. Jeurkar of Department of Hindi. Despite it the National Book Trust India, MHRD Government of India has sanctioned grant of rupees 0.48705 for book translation.

The 179 research papers were published in UGC care list/peer reviewed journals as well as the 77 books or chapters in books were published during last five years. The laboratory of Department of Chemistry has been recognized as a research laboratory by Shivaji University, Kolhapur.

To nurture students' ideas the Department of Electronics has established the Innovation and Incubation Center in which students design and develop new projects. Also organized workshop on Instrument awareness to acknowledge students about different instruments and their use. Each year various departments organize quiz and poster competitions such as Ramanujan, Uddan, Momentum, Chem-O-Joy, Willsoft, Ferment etc.

In tune with goals and objectives of the college, to spread science education and inculcate scientific temper among students the AVISHKAR Committee has successfully organized the 'Sangli District Avishkar 2021-22'. In it the twelve UG, seven PG students and four teachers were participated. It was the research project competition hosted by Willingdon College, Sangli in coordination with Shivaji University, Kolhapur. Seven students have been sanctioned DST inspire scholarship during their graduation. The students of Department of Chemistry have been received grant of rupees 0.20 lakhs under Research Sensitization Scheme of Shivaji University, Kolhapur.

Curricular and Co-curricular activities of the college are carried out in 05 huge buildings viz., Main Building with Annex including Junior College Section, Central Administration Office, Applied Sciences Building, Department of Electronics and new laboratory buildings for PG chemistry & physics.

There are well-furnished 27 classrooms available with sufficient lighting arrangement, wooden benches for sitting arrangements, glass boards, interactive boards, LCD projectors. For effective practical work, sufficiently renovated and well equipped 24 laboratories are there. There is prestigious ground plus two floors, 03 storeyed digitalized library block is included in main building having 8800 sq. ft. carpet area

During the admissions and exams, the free-support is provided for documentation, zexing, counseling and banking. The 120 CCTV cameras are installed to govern the campus. The 4 AMCs are made with the outer agencies to maintain facilities of drinking water, electricity, scanning and printing, computers, network and telephone. To monitor all facilities suggestion boxes are installed and feedbacks from students, alumni, faculties, non-teaching staff, parents and stake holders are analyzed.

The IT lab has Wi-Fi equipped computers. The UGC Network Resource Centre has five computers with Wi-Fi connectivity. The seven projectors are for staff and students. The library is fully automated, it schedules events and working through Library Committee. It is updated with N-LIST, INFLIBNET and VIDYASAGAR soft wares. The well-facilitated study-rooms are available at library. Rajarshi Shahu Chhatrapati Boys' Hostel and Girls' Hostel have more than 150 students. The rector supkeeps all arrangements under the guidance of Hostel Committee. The support services of CCTV cameras, mess, canteen, security, cleaning and sweeping services are maintained from contracts.

The equal preference is given to cultural and sports activities with education. The infrastructural facilities such as Open Theatre, Assembly Hall, Recreation Hall, Symposium Hall and sit-outs promote latent merits of students. The facilities of sound system, dais, notation pad, photography, video shooting, and musical instruments with proper coaching develop students' extra-curricular interests. The cultural activities are planned in corporation with IQAC and CDC. As a result of well and strict planning, many students have successfully participated University level Youth Festival. The MoU with YCMOU, for Yoga Diploma has initiated meditation and other yogic practices for personality development of all stake holders. The department of Physical Education schedules the out-door and in-door events. The Gymkhana Committee provides experts' guidance for sports events. The Gymkhana Hall has table-tennis, badminton, carrom,

chess and the gym. The vast ground aids to increase physical and mental strength. The students have raised college at the prestigious position through their record in a number of sports events on state, national and university level. The planning of sports events of teaching staff, non-teaching and students has nurtured the spirit of sportiveness and team work.

The library provides N-LIST, Calibre E-Library and Shodhganga for the academic curriculum.

The Shrimati Umabaisaheb Patwardhan College Library has 3 old and rare book libraries -

- Shrimant Saubhagyawati Umabai Saheb Patwardhan Mirajkar Library.
- Sangli State Library.
- Late H. H. Sir Chintamanrao Patwardhan's Personal Library.

The collections of books mentioned include many rare books, some of them are published before 1900. These collections also include State Gazetters of British period and entire works of Shankaracharya, Tolstoy, Dickens, Scott, Flaubert etc.

The library has its advisory committee to make policy decisions and manage the daily working of the library. The library is open for all working days and holidays including Saturday. During examination time all facilities are made available after office hours also. The library has ramp facility for physically handicapped students. The library is fully automated through Integrated Library Management Systems (ILMS) known as Libman Software which is developed by 'Mastersoft Software Company, Nagpur' Maharashtra. It consists of number of modules such as Masters, Book Management, SMS facility, Library cards, Barcode Facility, Book Accession, Membership, Circulation, OPAC, Web OPAC, M-OPAC, Catalogues and Administration. The library facility like data base back up, restore facility, books reservation facility, the status of books such as issued, withdraw/write-off/damaged/lost and paid is easily located. All the books have been classified with the Dewey Decimal Classification System.

The library offers various services to its users like automated circulation system, online public access, catalogue, reprography, internet browsing, library orientation, book banks facility, newspapers clipping, external readership facility, Inter Library Loan Facility, Reference service, Competitive Examination books services, SDI and CAS services.

The third floor of the library serves as a Reading Hall for students and is spacious enough to comfortably accommodate more than 250 students at a time. There are two separate reading halls for male and female students. In reading room there is a UGC-NRC Centre for access of internet and e-resources on 5 computers. The competitive Examinations section is updated in the study hall. The Newspaper clippings of career news are displaying on the display board and various newspapers clippings, files are maintained and made available for the students for their progress and smart study. The question paper set and syllabus of various courses are provided in the study room.

The library has provided online e-resources facility through N-List program for all students. The total 127 students and teachers are enrolled in this program. Through this program 138500 e-books and 6300 e-journals are available for the readers. The library has availed the facility of online e-recourses by providing email IDs and passwords to the students, teachers & stakeholders.

The perspective plan is designed as per the Vision, Mission and Objectives of the Institution. The Perspective Plan or the Strategic Plan is the blueprint of activities of the college to be undertaken during the five years. After the 2nd cycle of NAAC assessment, the perspective plan was prepared by IQAC and the Principal by considering recommendations from stakeholders, students, employers and faculties.

The strategic plan or perspective plan focuses on the infrastructural development, introduction of new courses, gender equality, enhancement of quality in the teaching-learning and evaluation process, research promotion, adoption of e-governance, student support services, best practices and green initiatives. The Perspective Plan was approved in the CDC meeting.

The Institute is affiliated to Shivaji University, Kolhapur, and is governed by the Deccan Education

Society (DES), Pune. The College has three-tier systems for its governance. At the Society level, the College is governed by the Chairman and the Secretary. At the College level, the Principal is at the apex of the administration and is assisted by the IQAC, Vice-Principals, HoDs, Registrar, teaching and non-teaching staff.

Administrative Setup:

- The Principal is the head of the institution and is responsible for the implementation of policies decided by the college development committee and the D E Society. He looks after the regular functioning of the institution. Three vice-principals and one PG Art coordinator assist the Principal in administration.
- The main functioning body of the College is College Development Committee (CDC). The CDC consists of the Secretary of the management or his nominee, Principal of the college, IQAC coordinator, one nominated HOD, three elected teachers and one non-teaching staff, four local expert members nominated by the management from the field of Education, Industry and Social service and Research field. CDC passes annual budgets and gives recommendations to management about academic and other quality initiatives.
- Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) is constituted as per the university guidelines. It plays an important role in quality enhancement in the delivery of academic services. IQAC convener plays a key role in deciding quality initiatives. It coordinates with statutory college committees and monitors the teaching, learning and evaluation process of the institution. It conducts regular feedback from students, teachers, stakeholders, parents, and employers and analyse and suggests improvements.
- The organization of Departments includes the Head, Professors, Associate Professors and Assistant Professors.
- The organizational structure of the library includes the Librarian, Assistant Librarian, Library Clerk and Library Assistant.
- The organizational structure of Physical Education and Sports includes the Director and attendants.
- Various statutory committees are also constituted by the Principal. The Principal along with the IQAC coordinates with these committees and monitors its functioning regularly.

Service Rules:

- The College follows the rules and regulations related to staff services like recruitment, promotion, etc. laid down by Shivaji University, Kolhapur, UGC, New Delhi and the Government of Maharashtra.

Performance Appraisal System for teaching-staff:

The performance of the concerned teacher is assessed by the Head of the Department, IQAC and the Principal on the basis of academic performance indicator (API) PBAS / ASAR and necessary action is taken for the improvement. Institution implements changes in evaluation system made by UGC, University and Government. All the teaching faculties follow UGC Regulations 2010 and four amendments thereafter for performance appraisal of teachers. For every academic year, IQAC collects an Annual Self Appraisal Report (ASAR) from the teaching staff as per the 7th Pay UGC Regulations 18th July 2018. The teacher's

performance is assessed on the basis of API SCORE by the IQAC coordinator and the Principal.

Optimum utilization of financial resources

The College invites departmental budgets with their requirements and justifications. The college office scrutinizes and prepares the annual budget. After central scrutiny, the detailed budgetary plan got finalized. Further, it is put forth at CDC for resolution. After the approval of the CDC, the Central Purchase Committee scrutinizes departmental purchase time being. The final order is given after the negotiation with vendors before CPC. The utilization of the sanctioned budget is monitored by the Principal, CDC and the central committee of the Deccan Education Society.

Internal and External Audits

Deccan Education Society (DES) has an inbuilt mechanism which performs timely checks on the expenditure made through college funds as well as through various funding schemes. DES has its own internal auditors who verify all financial transactions. The internal audit of the college is carried out by the DES Central office whereas the external audit is carried out by the Joint Director of Higher Education Kolhapur, the Senior Auditor and the General Auditor of the State. Statutory audit for the year 2017-18, 2018-19, 2019-20, 2020-21 and 2021-22 was completed through DES by S. M. Ghatpande and Associates. There is no any audit objection in the auditor's report. Fund allotment and disbursement through schemes is regularly checked and recommended to the Accounts Office through the Principal. Timely submission of audited Statement of Expenditure, Certificate of Assets Acquired, Utilization Certificate and Purchase of Library Books and Journals is executed well within the time framework and submitted to the funding agency.

7.1.1 Overview of facilities and initiatives taken to support Gender Equality

Our institute is ensuring equal concern for girls and boys in the institution in all curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities. The college is cautious about safety, security, hygiene and sanitation of girl students. College focuses on providing healthy and friendly environment to every student so that no student will lag because of any personal issues in curricular and co-curricular activities. Each department organizes various activities in which attention is given towards gender equity to remove gender discrimination in society as well as to make equal empowerment in different organizations.

Safety Measures:

- **Internal Complaint Cell** is established in the institute to address the complaints given by the girl students. The complaints are solved by the committee. All girl students are free to give the complaints regarding any harassment.
- The college campus is covered by CCTV for safety and security purpose.
- The institute arranges medical camps for students.
- **Women Empowerment committee** is formed which organizes various activities like guest lectures on women health issues, women empowerment, lectures to elaborate and create awareness about women rights and laws etc.
- Individual girl's common room is provided with adequate number of clean washrooms, restroom with fans, tables, Sanitary napkin vending machine. The girl students may rest, relax and refresh there. The purpose of common room is to create a stress free environment.
- **Anti-Ragging committee** is established to stop the violence against any injustice. The students in distress owing to ragging related incidents is supported and given courage to fight against ragging by the committee.
- **Ladies Hostel:** Girl students from outside city are provided by the ladies hostel facility in college campus under the observation of Rector. Hostel has rooms with all good facilities which help them to study in good environment. Mess facility is also provided. Sanitary Napkin Vending Machine is also installed in hostel. Hostel campus is also covered by CCTV. Girls are safe in the hostel as no one other than rector and girl students living in the hostel is allowed to enter the hostel without permission. Regular prayer and exercise activity is conducted to maintain physical as well as mental fitness of girls.
- **Separate Ladies staff room:** Ladies staffs are provided with separate staff room to sit in comfort.

Sanitary napkin vending machine is also present in ladies staffroom.

- NCC wing is established for girls, which also gives awareness in its programs.

- NSS unit is functional and active including equal participation of girls.
- Mentor mentee scheme is activated through which counseling is done regarding gender equity.
- Ladies staff members are giving continuous support and take responsibility of counseling with girl students regarding their behavior in college, different problems that faced by them in college campus or outside the campus.
- Security guards are appointed in college campus as well as in ladies hostel.

The institution has adopted two best practices- 1. Endowment Prizes for Meritorious Students and Memorial

Lecture Series

2. Willsoft- a National Level Technical Fest

Best Practice I:

1. **Title of the practice:**Endowment Prizes for Meritorious Students and Memorial Lecture series

2. **Goals:**

- To encourage the students to excel in academic and co-curricular activities as a part of social agenda. Endowment prizes are given to eligible meritorious students.
- To recall the memories of eminent Economist Prof. T. M. Joshi, Late Hon. V. S. Page pioneer of “**Employment Guarantee Scheme**” as well as to recall the memories of the founder Principal of Willingdon College “Late Hon. G. C. Bhate”.

3. The Context: Endowment funds are accounts created by Deccan Education Society, Pune in which the principal amount remains unspent. The interest and earnings are used for students' welfare in the form of prizes at various academic levels. For this purpose, college is maintaining goodwill with donors. Donors of this endowment appreciate the existence of an endowment fund as a means to plan for the future and not just surviving in the present. Following are the advantages of the college from Endowment Prizes:

- Enhance way of appreciation of meritorious students as prestige of college.
- Our society receives donations/endowments from eligible person for a period of 20 years.

Our college is organising memorial lectures for more than 30 years. The lecture series is started as a continuous practice to recall the eminent economist Ex-staff member, Prof. T. M. Joshi, Ex-student Late Hon. V. S. Page and Founder Prin. Late G. C. Bhate. Willingdon College has established the “T. M. Joshi Vicharmanch” in 1994, inaugurated by Prof D. A. Dabholkar, Ex-Vice Chancellor of Pune University. The V. S. Page Vicharmanch established in 1990, which was inaugurated by Shri Balasaheb Bharade, Social worker and Speaker of Maharashtra Legislative Assembly. G.C. Bhate was the founder Principal of Willingdon College, Sangli. The memorial lecture started from centenary year 2018-19, related to Environment Science, Biodiversity and conservation of energy sources etc.

4. The Practice: College has received donations from Staff, Alumni and others philanthropists towards endowment prizes for meritorious students. The endowment prizes are given every year since 1935. The college has the distinction of being the first institution among the UG colleges to distribute the endowment prize in the area of Shivaji University. The practice is continuously followed as a tradition till today.

Prof. T. M. Joshi Vicharmanch lecture series is arranged by the department of Economics. The lectures of eminent economist were arranged on the current topics like Trade cycles and Government Policies, Agricultural Industries- today's need, Current Market Trends, Inclusive Growth- Problems and Perspectives etc. for the students and staff members. The V.S. Page Vicharmanch lecture series is arranged the lectures of eminent personalities of various sectors like farmers/ workers/ market trends etc. From the academic year 2018-19 the G. C. Bhate lecture series is started to create awareness regarding non-

conventional energy sources, Environmental issues and sustainable development.

5. Evidence of success:

Large number of needy students has grabbed this opportunity by showing their excellence in the various academic events. More than 20 endowments prizes are given every year. Apart from this the scholarships are also given to the needy students. The hike in the competency level of the students is observed while scrutinizing the prizes. Similarly, the lectures of eminent persons/ social workers and scientist helped the staff, students and citizens of Sangli to know about the current trends in science, environmental issues, energy resources, economic policies and developments.

6. Problems encountered and resources required:

- The endowment amount which was kept in the earlier period was very small, so it can't be distributed to the students on large scale.
- Funds for the memorial lecture series are limited.

Best Practice II:-

1. Title of the practice: Willsoft- ANational Level Technical Fest

2. Goal: To explore the hidden talents of students through various competitions and to train students for event management by organizing this activity from local to National level.

3. The Context: The main objective of this activity is the overall development of students to face the challenges when they enter in real world after graduation. Students organize this event by raising funds through sponsorship from the society as well as alumni and they are trained to manage and execute this event for the students from different colleges. The activity includes the various competitions like C programming, paper presentations, treasure hunt, wall poster presentation, technical quiz, spot photography, competitions based on recent trends and video creating for social awareness.

4. The Practice: It was the great initiative taken by the students for the students from the academic year 2009-2010. The college authorities decided to promote this idea and encouraged the students to start it in the same year. Furthermore, the college has received a great response as it was started at district level and now it has been expanded and conducted at National level.

5. Evidence of success: The activity is benefited in many ways for the holistic development of the students. Following are the successful outcomes of this practice. It is useful-

- To develop communication skills while interacting with vendors, participants and fundraisers.
- To increase stage daring and presentation skills.
- To upgrade technical knowledge and its implementation.
- To encourage students to work as a part of a team increasing their team spirit.
- To deal with financial management.

Willingdon College, Sangli is one of the oldest and most reputed educational institutions in southern Maharashtra and is affiliated to Shivaji University, Kolhapur. It is well worth noting that for many years the Willingdon College was the only college run by Society in the whole Maharashtra - Karnataka area of the Old Bombay, outside the major cities of Bombay and Poona.

It's a matter great pride and prestige for us that Willingdon College has completed hundred years, on 22nd June, 2019, playing an imperative role as a great resource of knowledge and has contributed in the upbringing of great personalities who devoted their lives for serving the society through various fields. The Society and Institution under it have done splendid work. They have felt in creating not only a new Maharashtra, a new Deccan but also a New India.

The Centenary of the college, an event of historic importance, was celebrated in a right and royal manner by arranging a guest lecture series of an eminent personalities like Padma Vibhushan Dr. Raghunath Mashelkar, a renowned International Scientist, Magssessey prize winner environmentalist, Dr. Rajendrasinh Rana (Waterman), Mrs. Ashwini Kulkarni-Bhide (IAS) known as "Metro Woman", Mr. Popatrao Pawar Mr. Popatrao Pawar, Sarpanch, Hirave Bajar and Social Activist, Mr. Indrajeet Deshmukh, Additional CEO of Kolhapur District and Mr. Sushil Pandit, Prominent Kashmir Leader, World renowned Activist, Central Youth Festival, Music Fest organized by Alumni etc.

During this assessment period, we have organized 5 Faculty Development Programs, 4 Conferences, of that 2 are International and 2 are National. We have published 179 research papers, of that 121 papers are UGC care listed and 58 are peer reviewed. Moreover, we have published 2 books with ISBN number.

Our library has got unique status in Western Maharashtra. It is fully automated by using Libman ERP software. Library has 1,20,182 books, 56 Periodicals, 7500 Bound volumes, 12 Newspapers, 65 Theses, 177 non-print materials, 6300 N-List-E-journals and 195811N-List-E-books. Library facilities include

separate reading room for boys, girls, faculty members and research scholars.

An adequate building become the need of the of the college in order to fulfill the requirement of newly introduced PG courses in our college. Our Hon. Principal Dr. Bhaskar Tamhankar proposed the idea of raising the fund from the staff salary and construct a separate wing for PG courses. Staff appreciated this innovative idea and raised the funds Rs.44,35,015 from their salary for the introduction of new wing for Chemistry and Physics. The construction of two stored building, west wing facing the south of the old main building was constructed.

Faculty members of our college have contributed significantly for the social cause in the last five academic years. Along with their academic responsibilities teachers play very active role in the social welfare of the people in the vicinity. In the year 2019, when Sangli and Kolhapur districts were facing a natural calamity of flood, our institute has played a vital role to help the people from Sangli facing the trouble during flood situation. The arrangement for providing shelters and food packets was done in the college campus. The college has contributed a lot during the pandemic situation. To create the awareness about Covid-19 various activities were conducted like online quiz on issues related to Covid-19, guest lectures and webinars were organized by many departments.

Prin. Dr. B. V. Tamhanmkar was nominated as representative of the Shivaji University for the Cultural Exchange Program at Lovely Professional University, Phagwada(Punjab) in April 2021. Dr. Rajendra Ponde, HoD, Deptt. of English participated in the 15th International Conference on Short Story in English, Beyond History: The Radiance of the Short Story” organized by university of Lisbon, Portugal in June 2018. He was speaker for the session “Environmental Imagination in the Short Story” and participated in the American Literature Association (ALA) Symposium on the topic “The American Short Story: New consideration”, at New Orleans(USA) in Oct. 2019. Dr. Balwant Jeurkar from Deptt. of Hindi received award for his translation work from “Bharatiya Anuvad Parishad, Delhi” in the year 2018. Prin. Dr. B. V. Tamhankar worked successfully as a president of Rotary Club of Sangli in the year 2021-22. Dr. R. S. Ponde is the President of Rotary Club of Kolhapur mid-town for the year 2022-23.

- The institution developed an evaluation system based on OBE to measure the attainment of program outcomes, program-specific outcomes, and course outcomes for all UG and PG programs.
- The institution has introduced value-added and certificate courses to enhance the capacity of students in various areas.
- The institution encouraged to establish innovative centers within departments and begin identifying ideas leading to innovation through competitions and incubates.
- The institution can promote meaningful linkages with industries for internships and training of in-house students.
- The institution can integrate placement activities into the post-graduate curriculum and strengthen the mentoring system.
- The institution promotes research activities for young teachers and students through the IQAC and research committee.
- The institution promotes slow and advanced learners through the IQAC with various departments by using subject-specific criteria for counseling and promotion of learning.
- The institution has introduced value / knowledge based courses in "Democracy, Election and good Governance" & "Personality Development Program" for entry-level students.
- The institution has effectively implemented the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) for all programs.
- The institution carry forward the activities of community network in online/offline mode as per the situation
- The institution provides training for non-teaching staff for the effective use of ICT devices and activities for upliftment.
- The institution integrate library services on ERP and make it available for all registered users through ILMS system.
- The institution can motivate students to take up value-based courses that instill ethical and moral values
- All action items seem to cover a broad range of areas and can significantly improve the quality of education and enhance the overall learning experience of students

Concluding Remarks :

The college imparts quality and purposeful education in spirit of the Vision statement and core values. Considering students from different occupational backgrounds, college emphatically provides allroundmobility by offering placement training and recruitment services. The adoption of the CBCS structure is a positive step towards providing a common learning platform across the nation and involving industry experts in the design of curricula enhance the employability of graduates. The emphasis on experimental learning and practical knowledge is commendable , as it can help students to develop skills that are relevant to future careers. The involment of students in various activities and committees can also provide them valuable experience in leadership and teamwork

In light of above changes, the perspective plan and strategic plan has been revised with focus on developing infrastructure for teaching-learning and research. CIE Examination system has been made flexible and learner oriented. However, the Entry level of UG exams are conducted at College levels and also assessment is carried in the college. Orientation of teachers for research has been practised and teachers have been motivated for publishing their research articles in UGC CARE list journals. MoUs has paved way for exchange of ideas, research and faculty exchange. Faculty development programmes for teaching and non-teaching staff helped in upgradation of technology. However effective use of computer tools has helped in improving efficiency of the staff. Green practices like use of solar energy, Management of waste water and its use for gardening, rain water harvesting system, are some of the green issues which have been implemented. Outreach activities of NCC, NSS and linkages with NGOs have helped in reaching out to communities. This has helped students to learn about social issues. Student participation in various activities and committees has helped in shaping some of the important events/ activities of the college. Science popularization has been achieved through public talks and workshops and conferences. Overall the college takes positive steps towards improving the quality of education and enhancing the employability of its graduates.
